



THE ADMISSIONS POLICY FOR SWILLINGTON PRIMARY SCHOOL

Swillington Primary School is a Foundation School which has a shared trust with a number of other local schools – The Brigshaw Federation: A Co-operative Trust

The Governing Body is the Admissions Authority for the school as part of the co-ordinated scheme with the Local Authority. Parents and carers can apply online on the council's websites from 1st November 2016 for a place at the school or use the common preference form which must be returned as specified on the form.

There will be 30 reception places available in September 2016.

Children with a statement of special educational needs which names the school will be admitted to the school.

If there are enough places for everyone who has applied, we will offer every child a place.

If we have more applications than available places, the following over-subscription criteria will be applied:

Oversubscription Criteria

Priority 1

- a Children in public care or fostered under an arrangement made by the local authority. (See Note 1)
- b Pupils without a statement but who have Special Educational Needs, or with exceptional medical or mobility needs, that can only be met at a specific school. (See Note 2)

Priority 2

Children with brothers or sisters who will be at Swillington Primary School at the start of the academic year 2016-17. We can give priority for brothers and sisters if they are living in the same house and we receive your application by the closing date. (See Note 3)

Priority 3

Children for whom Swillington Primary School is the nearest primary school. (See Tie Break)



Priority 4

Other children, where Swillington Primary School is not the nearest primary school.
(See Tie Break)

Tie Break

Should a situation of full subscription be reached at any point in the allocation process, the places remaining for that category of priority will be given to children living nearest to the school, as measured by a straight line between the home and the school. The Local Authority uses a national computer system to measure the 'straight line' distance from the centre of the school building to the child's home address. (see Note 2)

Nursery

Attendance at a nursery or children's centre does not guarantee a place in the main school and parents and carers must apply for a place in the reception class.

Deferred entry to primary schools

Parents and carers of children who are offered a place at the school before they are of compulsory school age can defer their child's entry until later in the school year or until the child reaches compulsory school age in that school year. Where entry is deferred, the school will hold the place for that child and not offer it to another child during the remainder of the school year. Parents and carers can not defer entry beyond the beginning of the term after the child's fifth birthday, nor beyond the academic year for which the original application was accepted.

Parents and carers can also request that their child attends part-time until the child reaches compulsory school age.

Notification of Places

In accordance with the co-ordinated admissions policy, on 16 April 2015 the Local Authority will make the formal offer of a place to parents and carers or guardians on behalf of the Governing Body of the school. Parents and carers should contact the school to confirm acceptance of the offered place.

This will in no way affect parents' and carers' right of appeal for a place at another school.

Appeals Procedure

Parents and carers who want to appeal against the Governors' decision not to offer their child a place at the school must appeal to the Local Authority. Appeals should be addressed to the Admissions Team within 20 days of receiving the decision letter.

The appeal will be heard by an independent appeals panel. Parents and carers will receive notification of the date and time of their appeal hearing, to which they can go and make their case. If they wish, parents and carers may be accompanied by an



advisor or friend. Following the appeal, the Clerk to the appeals panel will write to parents and carers with the decision.

Waiting List.

After offers have been made on 16 April 2016 parents and carers can ask to go on the waiting list for any school. The waiting list will be held in criteria order of the admissions policy and will close on 31 December 2016.

Any places which become available will be filled from the waiting list.

Note 1

Looked-after children or fostered under an arrangement made by the Local Authority. Children who have been adopted from Local Authority care, children with a residency order and those with special guardianship immediately following being looked-after will all be included within the higher priority for looked-after children.

Note 2

In the case of special needs we will consider those children without a Statement who have exceptional medical or mobility needs which can realistically only be met by Swillington Primary School. Applications in these categories must be supported by a statement in writing from a doctor or other relevant professional. This is necessary because you will be asking us to assess your child as having a stronger case than other children.

Note 3

For these purposes, brothers and sisters must be living at the same address as your child. This also includes children living with the family, for example, foster children and stepchildren. The definition does not include cousins or families sharing a house.

Note 4

For admission purposes, the home address is where the child usually lives with their parent or carer. You must not give the address of a childminder or relative. When we make an offer, we assume your address will be the same in the following September but you must use your current address. If you move after the deadline of 15 January 2016 you must tell the school and the Local Authority of your new address.

Note 5

If a school has to move to a temporary site for any reason, such as the building being damaged by a fire, we will base our distance measurements on the school's permanent site.

Note 6

The Local Authority has a protocol to admit '*hard to place*' children, outside the normal admission round and above the published admission number, in accordance with the DfE advice. These are special cases arranged outside the boundaries of this admissions policy.



In-Year applications

From September 2013 parents will be able to apply directly to the school at any time for an in-year transfer. An application form is available from the school or from the Local Authority and you will be notified by the school of the outcome of the application.

Where a family has moved into the area from abroad, another part of the country or city, and the child is effectively out of education, the application will be considered for an immediate start in the school, if there is a place available.

Where parents simply wish for their child to change schools, the application may be considered for the start of the following term.



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
